


It was a great day out. Big thanks to Andrew for organising this event and arranging some nice weather.

## NC 500 in a Morgan

Heather and I embarked on the Scenic Car Tours trip of the NC 500 (North Coast 500).

The NC500 is a route that was established in 2015/2016 by the Scottish Tourist office and technically starts and finishes in Inverness and goes up and around the East, North and Western coasts of Scotland. Our route though was slightly different, as we didn't want to end back in Inverness, instead we continued to Fort William and then Loch Lomond.

On Saturday 7<sup>th</sup> June we set off in rain (at times heavy) to Peebles in the boarders to meet up with 6 other cars and their respective occupants. We managed to weave our way to Peebles by the long route though Kirby Lonsdale, Sedbergh, (waved at the Fat Lamb), Kirby Stephen, A66 to Penrith, then A6 to Carlise to pick up the A7 across to Selkirk and then on to Peebles.



We managed most of the A7 with the top down arriving at about 4:30 pm to the hotel.

Dinner was set for 7:30pm with the "group", and we duly met the owners of 2x Mazda MX5's, a couple that in the end drove their Toyota instead of their 1970 E-Type, then there were 3 chaps in a Maserati MC20, Porsche 718 Spyder & a CLS AMG Mercedes.

A fun evening was had by all - hick!

The Sunday opened with encouraging skies, and we set off for Inverness via Perth, Braemar, Balmoral, Tomintoul, and then Inverness. We drove pretty much all the way with the top down though there was still the odd patch of snow up high on the Cairn Gorms.

We stopped for lunch with the King at Balmoral (well sandwich in the car in the car park but no one will know).

The highlight for me was passing the infamous "snow gates" at Cockbridge, which you hear on Radio 2 travel bulletin which are the first to close in the early Winter.

Monday morning arrived and Heather drove us into Inverness for fuel then on to Dornoch for coffee. We accompanied another couple in an MX5. The day started to deteriorate in terms of weather as we set off for John O'Groats with the hood up. We drove though Wick, which we had hopes of being able to stop at a fish restaurant for lunch, but to be fair, we drove around the harbour and then made a swift exit.


On arriving in John O'Groats the weather brightened up, and we had the obligatory photo next to the sign (see pic).

Onward then to Bettyhill for our overnight stay.

The Tuesday opened with blue skies and we decided to take a walk after breakfast around Bettyhill and some of the coast line. It really is stunning – especially with blue skies. After the walk we headed off to Lochinver and stopped for coffee on the side of the road and visited smoo caves.



The route till then had been normal 2 lane roads of quite good quality but the road after Bettyhill became single track road with passing places every 200 yds or so. The drive became a game of watch the pot hole, watch cars coming towards you and watch for bumps and indents that if taken at speed would file 1mm of prime Morgan stainless steel exhaust off......



Wednesday, we headed to Gairloch, via the back road from Lochinver, this was a little challenging in places, but we were well rewarded with stunning scenic views – and the odd scrape of the tail pipe!

Enroute to Gairloch we passed Loch Ewe and took a pic of Adrian Longs former Cornish Shrimper moored peacefully in the Loch – this was again a nice day of driving with the hood down.

Gairloch itself was similar to that of Lochinver – hotel on the banks of the Loch looking out to see with the Loch looking like a mill pond.

The Thursday morning was goodbye time, as this was the last stop of the Scenic Car Tours tour – you were then left to your own devices as to how to travel home.

3 of us (2 x Mazda MX5s) and us decided

to travel via Applecross peninsular and journey down the Bealach na Ba (the pass of the cattle). This is the UK's version of the Stelvio Pass. With some exhaust crunching, we made it.....and we are glad we did it. Though I would not recommend this in the height of summer with motorhomes attempting it – it would be very stressful.

For us we went on Fort William for a night, in a glamping pod in the foothills of the Nevis range, then onto Loch Lomond for a night staying in Luss.

The Saturday was forecasted to be wet, and wet it certainly was. As we headed south on the M74 towards the boarders, we were hit with a thunderstorm and torrential rain for about 30 minutes. We were down to 30mph on the motorway with the three little

wipers frantically trying to deal with the deluge of water, but we made it through unscathed. I bet you didn't know that the roof joints and door shuts leak water © !!!

We arrived back home mid-afternoon after travelling 1,430 miles in 7 days.

It was well worth doing the NC500, the scenery is spectacular, and we were glad that we did the route anti clockwise. I know we could have booked up our own accommodation but booking it via Scenic Car Tours did allow us to meet other like-minded people and allowed us to engage in wider conversation, which added to the holiday.

If you are planning to do the NC500, do it.... You won't be disappointed, but pick your time. We were lucky in early June, not too much traffic, in July / August I think it would be hell, with all the motor homes.....


## **A Factory Visit**
